1	MAYOR KELLY: Good evening. Welcome
2	to our City Council Meeting. Today is
3	June 1st, 2021. We have two public
4	hearings this evening. The first public
5	hearing is capital budget amendment for
6	the city buildings. And I'll turn it
7	over to Commissioner Scirocco.
8	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: Thank you,
9	Mayor. This is a public hearing. This
10	is to amend the capital budget for city
11	buildings. This public hearing is to
12	amend the capital budget for City Hall
13	for the City Hall project because there
14	are remaining insurance funds that can be
15	allocated to the building.
16	The city buildings capital account
17	and the City Hall project were utilized
18	for the renovation and the restoration
19	project. However, as the council is
20	aware, these accounts are used to
21	maintain capital projects in both City
22	Hall and and city buildings. This
23	capital budget amendment adds the
24	remaining insurance funds and funds that
25	were not encumbered into city buildings

1	capital account for Project Number 1141
2	City Hall, and will be transferred into
3	budget line H3031492-52000-1141.
4	The total amount of the budget
5	amendment is \$135,329.30. It includes an
6	insurance reimbursement reimbursement
7	of \$132.326.36; 1,500 dollars that was
8	not encumbered from the 2018 to 2019;
9	\$1,346.30 that was not encumbered from
10	2020 to 2021; and \$156.64 that had not
11	been that had not been voided and was
12	available for transfer.
13	These amounts do not require bonding
14	or any additional funds from the
15	taxpayers but all but are amounts
16	already determined that the bulk of the
17	amend amendment being a leftover from
18	the larger insurance reimbursement total.
19	MAYOR KELLY: Okay.
20	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: And that's
21	it.
22	MAYOR KELLY: If anybody is here to
23	comment on capital budget amendment for
24	city buildings, please raise your hand at
25	this time.

1	Can nope, okay. So you're
2	standing, (indiscernible)?
3	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yep.
4	MAYOR KELLY: Okay. So
5	Commissioner, we're closing this this
6	evening.
7	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: Yes.
8	MAYOR KELLY: Okay, great. Then
9	we'll move on to our second public
10	hearing, and that is on the CDBG CARES
11	Act funding. Following a consultation
12	with the New York State Office of Homes
13	and Community Renewal, the Community
14	Development Department has been
15	encouraged to submit a full application
16	to HCR for Community Development block
17	grants CARES Act funding to support an
18	additional round of City's COVID-19 Small
19	Business Grant Program. If anybody would
20	like to comment on this, please raise
21	your hand.
22	Okay. We will be closing this
23	public hearing and voting on this this
24	evening also. So at this time we have
25	about two minutes to wait to start our

1 meeting, so we'll be back in two minutes. 2 Thank you. (Off the record) 3 MAYOR KELLY: We are back. 7	Public comment period will be up for
8	fifteen minutes.
9	As a reminder, public comment is not
10	a dialogue or discussion with the
11	council; however, at the end of public
12	comment, any council member may respond
13	to a comment.
14	Please raise your hand on Zoom if
15	you'd like to address the council, and
16	look for this button in the reactions
17	area of the tool bar on your Zoom window.
18	We will call your name and ask you to
19	unmute and start your video. Before you
20	begin, please state your name and the
21	city or town where you reside.
22	If you'd like to speak, please raise
23	your hand. Is anybody looking for public
24	comment this this evening?

MS. MCGRAW: Hi. My name is Darlene

22 Anybody else that wants to speak for

23 public comment tonight, please raise your

24 hand.

Oh, she's trying again. Hold on,

1 please. Be patient. 2 Can you hear me, Darlene? Darlene, 3 can you hear me? Hi, Darlene, can you hear me? 5 MS. MCGRAW: I can hear you. Can 6 you hear me? 7 MAYOR KELLY: I can hear you. Yes, 8 go ahead. 9 MS. MCGRAW: Okay. My name is 10 Darlene McGraw. I live here in the City 11 of Saratoga Springs. I am appreciative 12 that DPW has started with the potholes 13 but our streets need to be flat and even 14 surface. One street that is -- had 15 significant impact is Wright Street, and 16 that's close enough to the track. And 17 obviously, you know, we don't -- we only 18 care about the people that come here for 19 the summer racetrack season. So that's 20 why the City probably doesn't really care 21 about that section. 22 I am -- I -- I don't -- I don't even 2.3 know how to begin to say anything else 24

except the water problem. Our water is

disgusting. I'd rather drink out of a

1	damn toilet or eat out of the the
2	Hudson River and drink out of the Hudson
3	River that's got a ton of feces in it
4	than drink our water. And obviously, I
5	saw that you guys have water containers
6	inside your offices. So obviously, you
7	guys don't like drinking our water either
8	because you guys like to pay for other
9	water. So thanks for wasting our
10	taxpaying dollars.
11	And the City is expecting clean
12	water. So please give us clean water and
13	better streets. Thank you.
14	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you.
15	MS. MCGRAW: Bye.
16	MAYOR KELLY: Anyone else for public
17	comment?
18	Okay. Then we're closing public
19	comment period. And we're going to move
20	right on to our presentations. We have
21	two presentations tonight. The first one
22	is Complete Streets. And I'll turn it
23	over to Tina Carton.
24	MS. CARTON: Hi, my name is Tina
25	Carton, and I'm the Administrator of

1	Parks, Open Land, Historic Preservation
2	and Sustainability for the City of
3	Saratoga Springs.
4	Tonight I'd like to introduce Ken
5	Grey and Ted Orosz. Both are cochairs of
6	the Complete Street Advisory Board. And
7	they are going to be giving a
8	presentation on Complete Streets in
9	Saratoga Springs.
10	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you.
11	MR. GREY: All right. Thank you,
12	Mayor Kelly, and thank you, Council
13	People, for allowing us this opportunity
14	tonight. Ted's manning the screens and
15	I'll be yapping so but again, we we
16	appreciate the opportunity to let you
17	know what we've been up to this past year
18	and and what we're thinking about in
19	the near future and in the distant
20	future.
21	First of all, moving to what
22	Complete Streets is. I know the council
23	and the mayor know that we have the New
24	York State DOT definition
25	Ted, if we can move up to the

year going through COVID, certain things
have just really stuck out as things that
are important to our community. And what

And what we've seen over the last

we've learned is that streets are not

just for drivers. And we've also learned

15 about the importance of open space, so

that's part of our focus tonight.

If we didn't have proper planning in all the Complete Streets plans that have been updated over the years, we wouldn't be ready, as you'll hear some of the projects that have happened or planning to be happened. You -- you'll see that some of the investment, how it's coming

to benefit the City of Saratoga Springs.

25 How collaboration is going to help us by

1	working with the county and the
2	neighboring communities. The importance
3	of moving our plans to something that is,
4	quote/unquote, shuffle ready. And
5	looking at equitable type of projects to
6	make our projects more feasible for the
7	future in terms of opportunities for
8	grants and everything else.
9	What we're hearing is that Congress
10	very potentially will have some great
11	grant opportunities at the end of the
12	year. And if we're ready for them, the
13	City of Saratoga for the short and the
14	long term can really benefit.
15	So 2020, some of the progress. The
16	mayor, the many of the council, and if
17	you'll notice let's see, where
18	where are the the police in this
19	picture. I guess our picture changed.
20	But a lot of our police came on a cold
21	later winter day or early spring day
22	on their bicycles to celebrate the
23	completion of the Geyser Road Trail.
24	We'll hear more about the Missing

Links Project, which is a 1.9 million

1	investment in our Community Sidewalk
2	Program.
3	Significant progress has been made

for the Downtown Connector Trail in terms of rights-of-way. So we're getting near completion and ready to bring that out to bid for construction in 2022.

And we'll talk about the piloting of
Henry Street and Phila Street.

So the Missing Links Project, this is one that had -- had city council and the mayor not had the foresight to do this investment in our community, and I'll underline the word investment, we wouldn't be able to expand our sidewalks to many of the areas that were identified in Complete Streets. Neighborhoods that were looking for sidewalks to get people safely from point A to point B and also to Downtown.

Tina -- our Tina Carton, she'll be conducting at least four community meetings this summer on site, question and answers, to people in each of the communities to let them know about, you

L	know, how it's going to happen, how it's
2	going to benefit, and all those kind of
3	good things. But again, by identifying
1	these things in Complete Streets, it's a
5	real benefit.

The Greenbelt Trail we're all 6 familiar with. And some of these 7 projects are all linked to that Greenbelt 8 9 Trail. Geyser Road, the Downtown 10 Connector, Crescent Avenue Extension, 11 which we're getting ready; it's been pre-12 engineered. And we think there's some 13 great opportunities there.

Tina, Planning Board, and all, we went out to Louden Road to take a look at that to connect to the Downtown Connector eventually to get us out to Wilton and possibly even Saratoga Lake.

The Henry Street Project. And the whole point here is looking at the plans that we have in place, and then moving them to the next step so that we can take advantage of these grant opportunities.

Okay. There's the pictures of the police on bikes, the mayor, some of the

1	council	people,	and	some	of	the	kids	from
2	the elem	mentary :	schoo	ol.				

But the big celebration for Geyser 3 Road is that it's a, I believe, 2.8 mile 5 corridor that gets people from -- where over twenty percent of our city's 6 7 population can get safely to the 8 elementary school and safely to the 9 Saratoga State Park. Our goal, again, 10 with the Greenbelt Trail is to get now 11 people safely through Railroad Run and 12 down to Downtown and connect people 13 throughout the city.

This is a visual of what we see the Downtown Connector to look like next year. So this is over by High Rock Park, taking us out to Exit 15.

So goals for 2021. We talked late summer, early fall last year about reducing speed limits with some of the commissioners and the county supervisors. And there was genuine agreement that people drive too fast. That there's opportunities for safety and better living environment if we look at slowing

1	our speeds down.
2	So we're looking at updating the
3	Complete Streets plan again.
4	Coordination with the Planning Board has
5	been happening. Allen Drive and Louden
6	Road and some other projects, we're going
7	to continue that.
8	Tina Carton's been working with the
9	ADA Transition Plan.
LO	Again, a lot of these things
11	advancing the Greenbelt Trail, and more
12	and more it'll start making sense to the
13	community in terms of the benefit.
L 4	We'll be looking at education
15	programs, bike safety programs. The
L 6	importance of Flat Rock Park and other
L7	other pop-up parks throughout the
L8	community that we can take advantage of.
L 9	And also discussion about the entrance to
20	Congress Park.
21	And there's a visual of the Pride
22	crosswalk, which I believe DPW just
23	installed. It looks beautiful. And
24	thank you.

So reducing speed limits. I thought

1	about it the other day. A lot of our
2	speed limits were created when cars
3	had had clutches and we couldn't get
4	to zero to 40 in less than four four
5	seconds. I think we really need to look
6	at it again. I know there's a lot of
7	challenges and obstacles to how we get
8	this done, but I think there's general
9	agreement that people need to slow down;
10	they need to stop at stop signs. So
11	that's something I think that that's
12	the kind of culture that I hope that the
13	City leaders are are looking and will
14	try to find ways to help us achieve that.
15	And then looking at maybe reducing
16	speeds in the arterials.
17	Updating the Complete Streets Plan.
18	We're looking at Tina is looking at
19	trying to get a number of interns to help
20	update the Complete Streets map on on
21	the City website. And by doing so, it'll
22	identify Complete Street completed
23	projects, projects that are underway,
24	projects that are being proposed, and let
25	people that are just generously

1	genuinely curious to look at the maps and
2	say, all right, this is an opportunity;
3	we really should be looking at those kind
4	of things.
5	And we also want to kind of narrow
6	down our plan. It's kind of voluminous,
7	I guess the best way to describe it.
8	We've identified thirteen priority
9	streets, and I could bet nobody could
10	recite these things. So we want to look
11	at that. Adopt some new best practices.
12	Certainly look at how do we maintain
13	things, and we have to tie budgeting to
14	that. So again, we want to make this
15	report accessible to all. And we've
16	been, again, setting we've been
17	working with the Planning Board. And
18	that's been very effective in some of the
19	work that we've been doing.
20	Moving to the Allen Street slide.
21	And this is a picture of Ted Orosz on the
22	left. And I believe that's our Susan
23	Barden. I thought it was Tina but I
24	think it's Susan.

This was when we were going over the

1	Church Street Bridge. And we had we
2	were looking at the Allen Drive
3	development area. And it's an area where
4	there's going to be affordable housing
5	projects, and there's a lot of people
6	right now that are crossing either the
7	Church Street Bridge or Washington Avenue
8	Bridge. It was a lot more dangerous.
9	It's now a little bit more safe. But
10	ways how can we make it more safe for
11	people to get in through bicycle,
12	through well, bicycle, through
13	pedestrian walking.
14	The other area that we need to start
15	taking a look at is there's going to be
16	the advent, which is already happening,
17	with electric bikes and all those kind of
18	motorized elements. So again, looking at
19	the next five or ten years,
20	transportation is going to be a lot
21	different. And a lot of people that
22	can't afford to live in Downtown
23	Saratoga, how do we get them safely into
24	Saratoga is going to be part of our goal.
25	Again, Tina's working on an ADA

1	Transition Plan with the Capital District
2	Transportation Committee to look at
3	making our bus stops more ADA compliant,
4	and also looking at our streets and
5	having them more ADA compliant.
6	So coordination and collaboration
7	with communities outside of ourselves.
8	So namely, the county, Greenbelt Trail,
9	open spaces.
10	On an informal basis, we've been
11	working the Matt Veitch, and Tara Gaston
12	has joined us on this. And COVID kind of
13	got in the way. But we identified a bike
14	trail system throughout the county.
15	I know I I reached out to to
16	the the folks that handle the
17	insurance for the County. It happens to
18	be Travelers Insurance, who also I
19	believe still insures the City. And
20	Travelers was very, very interested and
21	very positive towards setting up bike
22	routes that were safe throughout the
23	whole county. And again, with the advent
24	of the Empire State Trail, there's going
25	to be more activity of people trying to

1	come into our community from all
2	different areas. Obviously, we want to
3	try to connect the Zim Smith Trail, and
4	get ourselves out to the Palmertown
5	Ridge, the Adirondacks.
6	So again, we're trying to work
7	together. If we work together, we can
8	get larger grants. We can get greater
9	opportunity for being selected for
10	grants. And we think we'll be smarter in
11	what we're trying to accomplish if we
12	work together with different communities.
13	The design of the trail connection
14	from Crescent Avenue from the State Park
15	to Nelson Avenue and the Northway, that's
16	been engineered. And we think that's
17	ready. And we have some possibilities
18	for grant money in the near future, so
19	stay in tune.
20	And working with Public Safety.
21	Bikeatoga, the YMCA, the school
22	districts, years ago we had actually met
23	with the Geyser Road Elementary School
24	and we were going to start doing some

bike safety training. Well, now we can

1	start doing those kind of things. And
2	the thing that I'll throw out is that
3	when we work with our kids and we educate
4	them, they educate us. And I think
5	they'll help us when we go to projects
6	such as lowering our speed limits, why
7	should we do these kind of things. So
8	it's going to be good for all.
9	The Flat Rock Park, we want to make
10	sure that it's secure and that it it
11	gets beautified for what lack of
12	better words. But you know, some of the
13	possibilities now with the the track
14	opening up in Downtown, if we attract
15	people from out of the area, from inside
16	the area to come down to Downtown.
17	Hopefully we can get a trolly system
18	that's reliable that gets us to the track
19	on a regular basis and back to Downtown.
20	If people are bringing their
21	families to lunch, they want to have an
22	area that they can sit and have their ice
23	cream after after lunch or after
24	dinner, that type of thing. Kick a

soccer ball, read a book, stay in the

1 shade. 2 But I think pocket parks have to be 3 something that the City really starts 4 taking a serious look at, and I think we 5 found for COVID how important the outside and the outdoors is to us, to our 6 restaurants, just to our general health 7 8 and our mindset. And also, I encourage City leaders to be looking at even the 9 10 possibility, rather than developing some 11 of these open space, parking lots that we 12 have that maybe not be utilized in the 13 future or just areas on a park -- or land 14 tracts on our tax roll, that maybe we can 15 make these into pocket parks so that 16 people can utilize them in all areas of 17 the city. So that's our goal. 18 Let's see. And Congress Park. We've been talking to several of the 19 20 businesses in the area, to Saratoga Arts. 21 And we're looking at opportunities 22 that --2.3 And if you move to the next slide.

-- of how we can kind of beautify,

maybe slow down traffic. If you've

1	driven from the south, you'll know that
2	it's a little bit dangerous coming into
3	that that area right there. You know,
4	it's not the most attractive entrance to
5	an entrance that is really beautiful
6	or to an area of Congress Park which is
7	really outstanding, really beautiful.
8	And maybe many of you don't know

And maybe many of you don't know that this area is also part of the Greenbelt Trail connecting areas. You'll see a concept design here of what a pilot project might look like if we narrowed the roadways and had some -- a little bit of activity there. If streetways on Broadway are slowed down, the gentleman that's riding his bicycle illegally on the sidewalk, maybe they'll be feeling a little bit more safe and they'll go on the streets. That's my sense of humor. Okay, pretty bad.

In conclusion, we're here to help.

We've got a lot of talent. We think

there's been a lot of good things that

have been happening, but I'd like to

start seeing us -- a lot of the things,

1	like the priority streets, that we can
2	start maybe escalating so that we have a
3	vision that it's instead of twenty-
4	five years from now, that we really try
5	to get the priority streets in place
6	within the next five years. And you can
7	only do that through planning and you can
8	only do that through cooperation and
9	identifying the government grants.
10	I give my compliments to the mayor's
11	team and Tina Carton, and really all of
12	city council for looking at these grant
13	opportunities. But again, collaborating
14	between departments and between
15	neighboring communities I think's going
16	to help.
17	So we hope that you take this
18	vision, and we seriously take a look at
19	how can we implement Complete Streets so
20	that we make a great community even
21	better of Saratoga Springs.
22	Thank you again for the opportunity
23	to speak tonight.
24	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. Thank you,

Ken and Ted.

1	Any comments from the council? I
2	just want to say that it looks like a lot
3	of things going on, and even with COVID,
4	you kept moving forward a little bit. So
5	that's pretty good. So congrats to you
6	all.
7	But I do believe that, you know, we
8	need to continue along these lines. And
9	I like that you did mention the the
10	maintenance piece of all of this, because
11	that's always been a little bone of
12	contention, you know, when they
13	everybody talks about doing a project,
14	that we we really need to have funding
15	somewhere in our budget for how to
16	maintain all these things that we're
17	creating. So
18	MR. GREY: Yeah.
19	MAYOR KELLY: that was good.
20	Thank you.
21	Any other comments from the council?
22	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Yes, I have a
23	comment. I thought that was fantastic.
24	And a long it feels like a long time
25	coming. It's been a long time since

1	Complete Streets has been on the agenda.
2	And it was just a terrific, you know
3	you know, very high level, you're doing a
4	lot, but you know, you hit all the major
5	topics. I thought it was very good.
6	I do look forward to hearing more
7	about the the partnership or the
8	potential project down there with the Art
9	Center, maybe the Visitor's Center. I
LO	thought I thought you showed a great
L1	photo of, you know, that all that
12	concrete and blacktop that you see as you
13	come in off Route 9 into the City of
L 4	Saratoga Springs. I think we could make
15	that more inviting.
16	And I know with talking to the Art
L 7	Center and Louise Kerr, like, she's got
L8	these ideas. I think she already sort of
L 9	does this now, but if she had a little
2.0	

these ideas. I think she already sort of
does this now, but if she had a little
more room, kind of rolls out a piano,
rolls out a giant bass, you know, and -
I -- I can envision music. You know, our
own little Paris down there in that

24	Springs High School joining us to make a
25	brief presentation on public space

1	recycling. They have formed their own
2	group called Fridays for the Future New
3	York Capital Region. Presenting tonight
4	with Ciara Meyers is Mira Diggery, am I
5	saying your name right? I hope.
6	MS. DEGREGORY: It's DeGregory.
7	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Jade Helal
8	MS. DEGREGORY: DeGregory.

12	for having us. We've been able to talk
13	with Commissioner Madigan and
14	Commissioner Scirocco a bit previously
15	about the importance of Downtown
16	recycling, and with Commissioner Madigan
17	a bit about specific bin design ideas.
18	So we're going to give a little bit
19	of background on the importance of public
20	space recycling, and then we'll get into
21	some specific ideas of what bins in the
22	Downtown area could actually look like.
23	MS. DEGREGORY: Okay. So there has
24	been an increase in single serve plastic
25	use coming from restaurants and local

1	businesses, and without public space
2	recycling, we are contributing to more
3	waste and more damage to our environment.
4	In Tuscaloosa, Alabama, sixty public
5	space recycling bins were installed and
6	have since collected approximately
7	twenty-three tons of waste per year.
8	That's twenty-three tons of waste that
9	would likely would have ended up in the
10	trash if not for Tuscaloosa's public
11	space recycling programs.
12	Keep America Beautiful reported that
13	in a study of eight communities, seventy-
14	five percent of materials brought into
15	downtown spaces and parks are recyclable
16	or compostable. And so without public
17	space recycling bins, more of these
18	materials enter landfills than in cities
19	that provide accessible public space
20	recycling.
21	The same Keep America Beautiful
22	report showed that communities that
23	provided recycling in public spaces had
24	less litter than those that had no public

recycling bins. So if we were to

1	implement recycling bins Downtown, there
2	would be less litter, reduced waste, and
3	a cleaner, greener community that
4	promotes sustainable decisions.
5	MS. COOK: Okay. So Saratoga cares
6	about recycling. In a Skidmore survey
7	conducted in 2018, half of the
8	participants said that they threw out
9	recyclable waste downtown but over eighty
10	percent said they would recycle it if
11	bins were available.
12	In the same survey, over sixty
13	percent of respondents said that the
14	responsibility for recycling downtown
15	lies in the hands of our local
16	government.
17	And lastly, nearly ninety percent of
18	respondents said they were supportive of
19	downtown recycling initiatives. This
20	overwhelming majority cited the economic
21	and environmental benefits of recycling
22	as their reasons for support.
23	MS. HELAL: Our recent change.org
24	petition got over 150 signatures. We had
25	many individuals leaving comments in

L	support for the twenty-eight bins. For
2	example, Zoe, who believes recycling bins
3	can make a big difference in the amount
1	of waste our community produces every
5	year, or Eli, who thinks that we need to
ō	save this earth, and that this is a small
7	step towards that.

MS. MEYER: So the benefits of

public space recycling really extend

beyond the obviously important

environmental impact and into the impact

on, you know, tourism and the perception

that local residents have of our

community.

It can reenforce our values as an inviting, clean and environmentally conscious place to visit. And given that, again, more and more cites like Tuscaloosa and New York City and even Albany, so very diverse places, have been implementing public space recycling programs. Our tourists are used to having recycling in their hometowns, and you know, it's in a nice accommodation that we could have to make their

1	experience in Saratoga even more
2	enjoyable.
3	In addition, people, especially

2.3

young people, are overwhelmingly
supportive of recycling. Ninety-two
percent of eighteen to thirty-four year
olds say that they recycle. And the
climate concern and concern for pollution
are major issues amongst young people.
So young people in the community and
young tourists are really, you know,
aware of what our city is doing to be
green or is not doing that we could be
doing to be greener.

It's not only young tourists,
though. In a Keep America Beautiful
study, eighty percent of respondents of
all ages said that public space recycling
was an issue that mattered to them and
that they thought was important.

In addition, seventy-nine percent of people surveyed at a Texas park said that they expected recycling in public parks.

So in places like Congress Park, recycling has become an expectation.

_	So really,	investing	in public space
2	recycling would	make a di:	fference for our
3	tourists and for	our resid	dents.

MS. COOK: So there's this popular theory called twin the bin, and basically what it is, is you place a recycling bin right next to a garbage bin so it forces everyone who goes up to it to make a decision between recycling and just throwing something in the trash. For example, if I walk up to it with a recycling -- or a plastic bottle, and I would be more likely to recycle it than to just throw it in the trash because the recycling bin's right there.

A study by the University of
Michigan found that switching from
identically colored bins to different
colored bins increased the recycling rate
from fifty-five percent to eighty-eighty
percent. So by making the trash bins
green or the recycling bins blue, it
makes it easier for your brain to
differentiate between the two as you walk
up to it.

The key to ensuring the success of public space recycling is to keep the message brief and clear. So labeling what goes in the bins, like, cans or bottles or just even the recycling symbol. Most people are willing and inclined to recycle as long as it's made as easy and simple as possible.

MS. MEYER: So now that we've seen, you know, the importance of public space recycling as a whole, and also ways to make public space recycling more effective, we've put together a list of different bin design options to look at to possibly implement in our Downtown area.

Obviously, all of the following bins are pretty effective when it comes to, you know, being easy to differentiate, what's recycling, what's trash, et cetera, but the aesthetic and the visual component of our Downtown area is obviously important to you. So after we've gone through these bins, we'd love to hear your input on what you think best

1	fits the vision for the Downtown Saratoga
2	area.
3	MS. DEGREGORY: Okay. So this is

the first bin. This is called the SplitTwo Stream Recycling and Waste Barrel
with a Lift-Off Lid. And you can see
that it has a bunch of different
customizable covers on the bottom. So
you see the, like, blue and black. You
could also switch those up with the ones

on the bottom that you can see.

What are the -- a couple of pros of this bin is that it's made of recycled plastic. It comes with heavy dual aligners. It has fading prevention. And it's made for outdoors. It meets LEED requirements and is ADA compliant. And it won't absorb moisture. It has limited maintenance needed, and there's clear labeling on it. And it's the similar size to our current bins.

Some of the cons is just that there's no room for signage. So if we wanted to instruct people how to use the bins or what to put where, we wouldn't

1	really be able to do that with these
2	bins.
3	MS. HELAL: So this bin is very
4	similar to the previous one with the same
5	pros and cons. It is a little more
6	expensive due to its hinged doors instead
7	of the lift-off lid, and it's also a
8	little taller. So it really depends on
9	what's more convenient for the DPW
10	workers.
11	MS. COOK: This is the doubled
12	Double Recycled Plastic Trash Can, and
13	it's sixty-four gallons. So pros are
14	with this that it comes with connecting
15	brackets and labeled lids. It can
16	withstand harsh weather. It's natural
17	looking, and there's no need for sealant.
18	But some cons are that the recycling
19	trash look very similar. So with that
20	twin the bin theory, there's not
21	different colors so it might be difficult
22	for people to figure out which is the
23	recycling and which is the trash. And it
24	comes unassembled.

MS. DEGREGORY: Okay. So this is

1	the Manchester Sideload Double Recycling
2	Station. This also has a bunch of
3	different color options. It's
4	maintenance free. It has heavy duty
5	liners. It's used it's made of
6	stainless steel. And it has hinged doors
7	for access. It has rust resistant
8	hinges. And it can come with restrictive
9	openings; nobody can get into it. And
10	it's rot resistant.
11	But some of the cons are that
12	they're very expensive, and they're
13	larger than the usual bins.
14	MS. HELAL: This is the Dorset
15	Sideload Double Recycling Station. This
16	is similar to the last bin and this bins
17	pros and cons vary based on the
18	customizations made.
19	It has multiple color options, as
20	shown in the picture. It's more
21	expensive as it's taller and wider than
22	the previous bin. These bins are the
23	ones that closest resemble the bins that
24	are in currently in Albany.
25	MS. COOK: This is the ArchTec

1	Parkview Trash & Recycling Receptacle
2	Combo. Some pros about this one is that
3	it won't rust and it won't dent or chip.
4	There are decals available that we can
5	get. It has a built-in divider. It's
6	weather proof and has a fire safe finish.
7	And there's built-in stability.
8	Some cons about it are is that it's
9	not as aesthetically pleasing as we'd
10	like it to be with our Downtown and our
11	vintage aesthetic and it's less
12	modifiable.
13	MS. MEYER: So this is the
14	Transition TXZ from Clean River. This is
15	another bin that really is truly
16	customizable to meet whatever needs we
17	have. So obviously size varies, color
18	varies, all of that stuff. The color
19	options are right here to the right of
20	the pictures. So depending on if we
21	wanted a more natural look, we can go
22	with browns and greens. If we wanted
23	something more bright and colorful, we
24	could go with blues and greens, all of
25	that good stuff.

1	There's also, obviously, room for
2	signage and really clear labeling. One
3	thing that's particularly helpful about
4	these bins is a lot of their labels come
5	with images, which is useful because some
6	people who won't necessarily take the
7	time to like read a list of what can go
8	in the bins will, like, see a picture and
9	know, oh yeah, I have that in my mind,
10	now I know where to put that in the bin.
11	Because of the customizations, the

Because of the customizations, the price does vary, and so we would need to get a quote if we wanted to go with this bin for the exact, you know, version you're looking for. However, Sustainable Saratoga a couple years ago got a quote for a similar model that's no longer sold. But as you can see, pretty similar color, pretty similar size, pretty similar signage. So I can't imagine the pricing would be that different.

And this one is for thirty bins, so not twenty-eight like the others, costs just over 37,000 dollars, and that includes shipping, handling and tax. So

1	this	is	definitely	a	pretty	good	option
2	to lo	ook	into.				

And then these are the Albany's bins that we referred to previously. The really good thing about this is it just gives you a sense for what these bins would look like in a actual, you know, street setting. We're not exactly sure where these bins are from but they're obviously very similar looking to the Dorset Sideload Bins that we looked at earlier.

2.3

Overall, regardless of what bin you decide to go with, obviously, the price varies a lot. The lower end bins are about 20,000 dollars total for all twenty-eight. Higher end is more like 55,000 dollars total for all twenty-eight. But either way, regardless of what price point we land at, exactly what customizations we go with, really Downtown recycling is just such an important part of being a sustainable city.

So we'd love to hear your input on

1	the different bin designs and clarify any
2	questions you may have. We're planning
3	on meeting with the Special Assessments
4	District soon and discussing different
5	bin designs with them per Commissioner
6	Scirocco's suggestion. So hear their
7	input as well. But again, we'd just love
8	to hear your thoughts and answer any
9	questions you may have.
10	MAYOR KELLY: Any comments from the
11	council?
12	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: I want to
13	thank you guys again. I mean, you know,
14	for for being the (indiscernible) of
15	the especially a downtown, and you
16	know, with this presentation again, it's
17	a good presentation. I'd be curious to
18	see what what Albany, what their
19	recycling program is like and and how
20	much use that it actually gets and how
21	they you know, how they actually do
22	it.
23	Again, we you know, going into
24	it, we really don't have a plan going

into it. By putting together, you know,

the -- the bins out there and -- and that 1 2 sort of thing, I think we need a plan 3 like -- like we discussed in the past to actually make it happen. 5 But again, you know, I think it's 6 going to be something that we're going to have to put in the 2022 budget, the 7 8 capital budget. They're -- they're 9 pretty expensive items. I think it's a 10 great idea. I -- I introduced something 11 similar to this back in, I think it was, 12 2013. As a matter of fact, I still have 13 the barrel, and it's similar to -- you 14 know, to one of those -- one of those 15 barrels. And I was thinking about just 16 for the heck of it sticking it out there 17 to see who would use it and who wouldn't 18 use it. 19 Again -- but -- thanks for doing it. 20 And I look forward to, you know, working 21 with you in the future. 22 MAYOR KELLY: Yeah, I think it was a 2.3 great presentation. Thank you for 24 coming. And you know, I would defer to

Commissioner Scirocco on this. I support

2	what I've seen with the ones with the
3	flat on the top is sometimes when they
4	got full, then they start putting stuff
5	on the top flat area, like, for the ones
6	in Albany. But I think it's a great
7	idea.
8	And I and I think going to the
9	Downtown Assessment District was a good
10	idea from Commissioner Scirocco because
11	I I think you'll get some some play
12	there too.
13	COMMISSIONER DALTON: I thought you
14	guys did an excellent job. That was a
15	super thorough presentation, detailed.
16	The compare and contrast of all the
17	different designs was awesome. And I'm
18	just so happy to know that there is a
19	group of people out there and residents,
20	especially younger ones, who are
21	passionate about recycling and are
22	pursuing this project. So I think it is
23	like incredibly, incredibly needed
24	Downtown. So I just applaud your

efforts, and I'm here to support whatever

1	decision you all land on. So thank you.
2	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: So I'll
3	finish up by thanking you all very much.
4	It was a great presentation. None of
5	those garbage cans are cost prohibitive.
6	I don't think we would make this a
7	capital project because it's not a very
8	significant amount of money. We usually
9	capitalize really expensive much more
10	expensive machinery or you know,
11	infrastructure type projects.
12	So if we could get a determination
13	on a bin that we liked, we could make
14	sure that we were including those funds
15	in the budget, and potentially sooner
16	than later because I think it is time to
17	move forward on public space recycling.
18	I'm not sure what kind of plan we
19	need. I don't know if it should be up to
20	high school students necessarily to come
21	up with the plan. And so I don't know
22	what it takes to get the garbage out of
23	the bins and get it over to the Transfer
24	Station.

I know we had talked about

1	potentially using two different colored
2	bags; one for like, if we did one of
3	those dual bins and you know which one
4	I like, right. I like the top the
5	tall one that's on an angle that we can,
6	you know I think we all like that one,
7	right. I know when I met with you
8	guys I don't know what the rest of the
9	council like. I think Commissioner
10	Franck is leaning toward that one too,
11	trying to give you some feedback on the
12	bin that he likes. Because we can use
13	some cool signage there. We can even
14	swap out the signage at times.
15	It could even be a revenue
16	generator. Like the flags, you know.
17	Maybe when we do the flags, we could put
18	something, you know, that coordinates
19	with the flags for different events and
20	whatnot in that front part of the
21	signage. I don't know. And then it
22	still leaves room up at the top for, you
23	know, what we want to recycle and where
24	we want other waste to go.

So you know, if we can come to a

1	decision, meet with the Special
2	Assessment District, I think that is a
3	good idea. Get some input from them.
4	They seem to care about the garbage cans
5	and the look and the feel of the
6	Downtown, and maybe we can come up with a
7	plan and a cost.
8	And I don't you know, I I'll
9	leave it to Commissioner Scirocco to tell
10	us what what it takes to bring two
11	different colored garbage bags to the
12	I'm thinking the Transfer Station. I
13	know County Waste stops at the Transfer
14	Station. I've had many conversations
15	with them about this. And one goes into
16	the typical waste, and then maybe the
17	other one goes to them to go to the
18	single street single stream plant.
19	So I thought it was terrific. We're
20	moving forward. And I look forward to
21	hearing, you know, how how it goes. I
22	would actually like to attend your
23	presentation to the Special Assessment
24	District.

25 COMMISSIONER DALTON: I will say

1	from a fairly visual perspective,
2	actually I think it was the second option
3	would be the best if just from what
4	people are used to seeing now. Just from
5	a visual perspective, that would be my
6	feedback on the design.
7	MAYOR KELLY: Okay. Any other
8	comments?
9	Well, thank you, girls, for coming
10	this evening, and I'm sure we'll be
11	seeing you again soon. Thank you.
12	MS. MEYER: Thank you for having us.
13	MAYOR KELLY: Yep.

5	first item is an Announcement:
6	Implementation of Independent Advisory
7	Committee, New York State Police Reform
8	and Reinvention Collaborative Plan.
9	Tonight I will be announcing the
10	Independent Advisory Committee which will
11	assist us with the implementation of the
12	New York State Police Reform and
13	Reinvention Collaborative Plan.
14	On March 31st, 2021, the council
15	adopted a resolution in compliance with
16	Executive Order 203. The work of this
17	advisory committee is the next step. The
18	committee has a dual role. Members will
19	research and analyze how a citizens
20	review board will be implemented in
21	Saratoga Springs, and then provide the
22	council with their findings for
23	deliberation and decision this year.
24	The second item is members will
25	advise the police chiefs and the

1	Commissioner of Public Safety in
2	implementing the recommendations adopted
3	in the resolution.
4	The Advisory Committee will report
5	the progress of their work to the council
6	and the public at the first regular
7	council meeting each month. The members
8	of the advisory committee are: Charles
9	"Chuck" Caputo. Chuck has has worked
10	most of his career in human service field
11	in senior management for a large complex
12	organization, and also worked with U.S.
13	and Canadian public and private
14	organizations to establish and be best
15	practice operating standards in their
16	organizations.
17	Chuck spent two years working with
18	the military in a similar training and
19	consulting role.
20	He helped redesign the health care
21	delivery in Nassau and Eastern Queens to
22	create a new health and wellness
23	opportunity for Medicaid beneficiaries.
24	In addition, he was the executive
25	director of a children's day treatment

1	program in Queens, New York for several
2	years at Lifeline Center for Child
3	Development.
4	Chuck has volunteered with several
5	community groups and has lent a hand to
6	help plan fundraisers, implement new
7	programs, establish systems, write
8	policies, and complete strategic plans.
9	He has been on the board of Saratoga
10	Pride for the last two years. Most
11	recently he has served on the Saratoga
12	Police Reform and Reinvention Task Force
13	to help the city comply with Executive
14	Order 203.
15	My second choice of my second
16	appointment to this committee is Kimberly
17	A. Galvin. Kim is a lifelong resident of
18	Saratoga Springs. She graduated from
19	Saratoga High School and from Union
20	College and Vermont Law School. As a
21	lawyer, all but one of the thirty years
22	has been in public service.
23	She has been the assistant public
24	defender in Albany County, the chief

assistant district attorney in Rensselaer

1	County, the assistant attorney general in
2	the criminal division, and the chief of
3	staff in the legislature to the Assembly
4	Minority. Kim currently serves as
5	counsel to the New York State Board of
6	Elections.
7	She has served as Commissioner of

She has served as Commissioner of

Public Financing Statewide Task Force in

2019, and on the Civil Service Commission

and the Police Reform Task Force in

Saratoga Springs.

My third appointment and my final appointment is Jason Golub. Jsaon is VP and Chief Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer for Walker & Dunlop. Prior to joining Walker & Dunlop, Jason was a senior leader at GE where he was chief compliant officer and ran global and legal corruption investigations for the power business.

He was a security enforcement lawyer for a number of years before that, focusing on security fraud and insider trading investigations.

Jason served as a cochair of the

1	Police Reform and Reimagination Task
2	Force for Saratoga Springs. He holds a
3	bachelor of arts from Connecticut College
4	and a JD from the from Columbia
5	University School of Law.
6	The work of this committee is
7	important to the community. And the city
8	council appreciates the dedication and
9	generous commitment of time from each of
10	these members of the advisory committee.
11	My second item is Discussion and
12	Vote: Authorization to Submit New York
13	State CDBG-CV Application to Support the
14	Second Round of the COVID-19 Small
15	Business Grants.
16	In the winter of 2020 to 2021, the
17	Community Development Department utilized
18	a portion of the City CDBG-CV entitlement
19	allocation to the fund Small Business
20	Grant Program. Though the program proved
21	successful, it the evident needed
22	to it was evident it needed additional
23	grant based assistance amongst small
24	business owners persisted.
25	The Community Development Department

1	proposes to seek additional funding
2	through New York State CDBG-CV funding to
3	support an additional round of this
4	program to preserve jobs held by persons
5	of low income which would otherwise be
6	lost to the economic impacts of COVID-19.
7	Relief to small businesses through
8	the provision of fourteen grants of
9	15,000 dollars in working capital will
10	facilitate this job retention. The total
11	grant request is 250,000 and no match is
12	required.
13	I move that the city council
14	authorize the submission of the New York
15	State CDBG-CV application to support a
16	second round of COVID-19 small business
17	grants. This is a motion. Is there a
18	second?
19	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Second.

1 Saratoga Pride Month 2021.

With that, I hereby proclaim whereas the City of Saratoga Springs is well known and enjoyed for many reasons, in recent times, our citizens have added to our good representation by providing a supportive and understanding community for many diverse groups. Although it is not part of our -- our city's motto, health, history, and horses, a fourth H, human rights, is extremely important to us.

Whereas Saratoga Pride is a local group of LGBTQ-plus citizens, there are families, allies, and supporters who work to increase their visibility and safety as members of our community. They conduct events, provide resources, information, education, and advocacy, and maintain a positive image and a positive outlook.

Now, therefore, I, Mayor Meg Kelly,
Saratoga Springs, am pleased to recognize
the work of Saratoga Pride and extend

10	Vote: Rescind the Health and Safety
11	Policy During the COVID-19 Pandemic.
12	Employees and visitors who are fully
13	vaccinated against COVID-19 are no longer
14	required to wear a facial covering or
15	socially distance. Anyone who is not
16	fully vaccinated must continue to adhere
17	to previous mask and distance
18	requirements.
19	Additionally, city departments are
20	no longer required to manually check
21	temperatures. It is the responsibility
22	of the employees and the visitors of city
23	buildings to follow this new guidance.
24	Anyone who does not wear a face covering
25	affirms they have been fully vaccinated.

1	Employees and visitors may choose to
2	continue wearing a mask regardless of
3	vaccination status, including those who
4	are public facing, who are immune
5	compromised, or those who are
6	uncomfortable around unmasked
7	individuals.
8	The City of Saratoga Springs reminds
9	anyone who is exhibiting symptoms of
10	COVID-19 or is feeling unwell should stay

23	evening on my agenda, would be Award of
24	Bid: Tree Inventory and Forest Management
25	Plan to PlanIT Geo, LLC.

1	Upon the recommendation of the
2	Department of Public Works, I move to
3	award the bid for tree inventory and
4	forest management plan to PlanIT Geo,
5	LLC, not to exceed the amount stated in
6	Bid 2021-06. And that's a motion.
7	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?

16	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you,

18	We're on to finance. Commissioner
19	Madigan.
20	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Thank you,
21	Mayor. The first item on my agenda is an
22	update on city finances.
23	This is our ongoing report on city
24	revenues, expenses, cash flow, as well as
25	the status of federal and state funding.

1	And based on involving information as
2	well as our carefully considered and
3	well-coordinated budget actions, the
4	future is looking more financially stable
5	and healthy.

2.3

The 2021 budget was designed to be amended as the pandemic economy evolved when and if the City's revenue and cash flow is able to support the changes. So I have been meeting and have met with most departments to discuss those amendments. And each department -- actually, I guess, I -- we've met with everybody, you know, whether it was at Zoom or one on one. And so we have been discussing with each department, you know, what they would like us to try to be able to do as we're going forward with the rest of the year.

Priorities were stated, you know, somewhat from the beginning. First and foremost, I wanted to be able to address employee wages. And we had a meeting to discuss that this morning. And it is my intention to make our employees whole in

1	terms of 2021 wages effective it's all
2	our intention based on our meeting,
3	effective August 1 of 2021. And to let
4	City employees and the public know that
5	we we will be effectively coming out
6	of our hiring pause a little bit early.
7	I had asked for the pause through
8	June 15th, but we have timing issues,
9	especially with police and fire in terms
10	of getting candidates ready for their
11	various police and fire academies. So
12	coming out of this, you know, a little
13	bit early, but I had enough time to do
14	some level of analysis, so that was very
15	helpful.
16	And we've also received some other
17	good news, which I'll discuss as I, you
18	know, move forward on this agenda item.
19	So next so that that basically
20	means rehiring. This isn't about new
21	hires, but you know, we've been putting
22	off replacements for people who have
23	retired or maybe we had the census for

certain employees but we haven't -- we

don't have full funding for certain

24

1	employees to replace them. And we're not
2	going to be able to do all of them but
3	we're going to try to do what we can do
4	to get through the rest of the year.

2.3

2.4

The next priority that I wanted to address was essential services that may be suffering due to reduced pandemic budget. To date we have compiled about 2.3 to 2.5 million dollars in expense budget increases. About half of this would be the reinstatement of the 2021 employee contracts. Some of these requests, again, may -- may move to consideration in the 2022 budget.

Regardless, we're doing our best to meet employee department and city needs all in compliance with the Office of the State Comptroller, state and federal advice regarding how to best manage the budget, and how to best expend the federal funds, and how to best come out of this pandemic economy in a financially healthy and strong way.

We have had several revenue updates based on recent disbursement, as well as

1 year to date amounts received. These 2 actually total about 2.4 million dollars, 3 and I'm not going to go into the details on every one of them that it -- it 5 includes. But sales tax will be revised 6 by about 2 million dollars. You know, we budgeted 1.16 NVLT. We're getting 2.3 7 million. 8 9 Mortgage tax is very strong. 10 Planning Board fees will be going up. 11 Building depart -- building permit fees 12 are going up. You know, the one -- the 13 one that we sort of had a real decrease 14 on really was federal aid. We budgeted 5 15 million and we're going to get 3.9 16 million. But looking at other revenues, 17 you know, the budget's looking healthy, 18 as is our cash flow outlook in the here 19 and now. 2.0 So on May 27th, the City did receive 21 a reimbursement of 1 million -- 1.67 22 million in a long awaited cash 2.3 disbursement for the Geyser Road Trail. 2.4 We put the money out, and then we wait to 25 get reimbursed. And so that

1	reimbursement has come, and that
2	absolutely helps with cash flow.
3	This added to the recent
4	disbursements of VLT aid, the fair the
5	American Rescue Act Fund, made it much
6	more likely that we may be able to clear
7	the books on at least one of the two
8	short-term loans that we took last year
9	to cover payroll and other expenses when
10	annual revenue stalled. And since June
11	is a month in which the City makes a much
12	greater than usual number of
13	disbursements, including remittance to
14	the county and school tax amounts that
15	the City's collected, it's good timing.
16	And this is also when we make a big
17	payment on debt service.
18	So thanks to good cooperation from
19	each of the departments, working with the
20	Finance Department, our improved
21	financial situation allows us some
22	options and a positive outlook as we
23	consider the rest of 2021 and consider
24	these budget amendments and prepare for

the 2022 budget season. Thank you.

1	My remaining items are Budget
2	Transfers and Amendments. The second
3	one, my item is Discussion and Vote:
4	Budget Transfers - Payroll.
5	Lines 1 through 4, transfer to 207A
6	and 207C budgets for active but disabled
7	firefighters and police officer wages
8	from firefighter and police officer
9	regular wages in the amount of \$6,640.12
10	for firefighters, and \$9,501.72 for
11	police officers. I move that the city
12	council approve the budget transfers -
13	payroll as included with the agenda.
14	This is a motion.
15	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?
16	COMMISSIONER DALTON: Second.
17	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Second.
18	MAYOR KELLY: Any discussion? All
19	those in favor say aye.
20	IN UNISON: Aye.
21	MAYOR KELLY: Any opposed? The
22	matter passes.
23	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Thank you.
24	Item number 3 is a Discussion and Vote:

Budget Amendments - Payroll.

1	Lines 1 through 3 amend the budget
2	to include reimbursements received from
3	the Capital District Drug Enforcement
4	Task Force covering overtime and Social
5	Security. I move that the City Council
6	approve budget amendments - payroll as
7	included with the agenda. This is a
8	motion.
9	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?
10	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Second.
11	MAYOR KELLY: Any discussion? All
12	those in favor say aye.
13	IN UNISON: Aye.
14	MAYOR KELLY: Any opposed? The
15	matter passes.
16	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Item number 4
17	is a Discussion and Vote: Budget
18	Amendments - Capital for Project 1141.
19	This will also be on Commissioner
20	Scirocco's agenda and was the subject of
21	a public hearing this evening. Lines 1
22	through 4 amend the budget to include
23	reimbursements received for repairs to
24	City Hall. These will be used to
25	complete various City Hall building

1	projects associated with the post-fire
2	renovation of City Hall. I move that the
3	city council approve the budget
4	amendments - Capital Project 1141 as
5	included with the agenda. This is a
6	motion and it does require a four-fifths
7	approval and a roll call vote. But we do
8	need a second. So this is a motion.

5	Lines 1 through 4, transfer to the
6	IT Department to cover an encoder that
7	will enhance City Hall's security, and
8	transfer to risk and safety for security
9	improvements to the 5 Lake Avenue
10	entrance. Each in the amounts of 16,414
11	dollars and \$11,980.13 respectively. The
12	total transfer is \$28,394.13.
13	Prior to the transfer, this
14	expenditure appropriation for contingency
15	held \$220,045.83. Subsequent to these
16	transfers, there will remain \$191,651.70.
17	I move that the city council approve the
18	budget transfers contingency as included
19	with the agenda. This is a motion.
20	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?
21	COMMISSIONER DALTON: Second.
22	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: Second.
23	MAYOR KELLY: Any discussion? All
24	those in favor say aye.
25	IN UNISON: Aye.

1	MAYOR KELLY: Any opposed? The
2	matter passes.
3	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Thank you.
4	And that concludes my agenda.

14	On this capital budget amendment, as
15	remaining insurance funds and funds that
16	were not encumbered into city buildings
17	capital account for Project number 1141,
18	City Hall, and will be transferred into
19	budget line H3031492-5200-1141. The
20	total amount of the budget amendment is
21	\$135,329.30.
22	Therefore, I move for approval or
23	I move to approve the capital budget
24	amendment for city buildings in the
25	amount of \$135,329.30. And I put that in

1	the form of a motion.
2	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?
3	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Second.
4	MAYOR KELLY: Any discussion? All

2	the Water Treatment Plant. And I put
3	that in the form of a motion.

11	chemicals for the Water Treatment Plant.

8	for polyaluminum chloride chemicals for
9	the Water Treatment Plant. Put that in
10	the form of a motion.

8	received a grant as a part of the DEC's
9	Urban and Community Forest Program, which
10	works to increase public awareness of the
11	importance of trees amongst communities
12	developed, and implement comprehensive
13	tree management plans to create healthy
14	forests while enhancing the quality of
15	life for residents.
16	The City of Saratoga Springs has
17	selected PlanIT Geo to complete Phase I
18	of the street inventory and forest
19	management plan in the City of Saratoga
20	Springs, New York. The certified
21	arborist chosen for the project is
22	required to have an internal
23	International society of Arboriculture
24	(ISA) confection certification.
25	Task 1 is a GIS based street

1	inventory will be performed to collect
2	tree data and various sites attributes.
3	The certified arborist will complete a
4	tree inventory that will include all
5	street trees on public property within
6	the Phase I project and within the city
7	right city right-of-way, approximately
8	ninety miles of city right-of-way.
9	Task 2 is create and complete a
10	forestry management plan for the City of
11	Saratoga Springs, New York for approval
12	and adoption by the City of Saratoga
13	Springs City Council.
14	The certified arborist will work in
15	partnership with the City of Saratoga
16	Springs to collect, analyze, and use data
17	to adopt a completed forest management
18	plan after fully understanding the
19	findings of the tree inventory.
20	Therefore, I move for the mayor to
21	sign a contract with PlanIT Geo for Phase
22	I Street Tree Inventory Management Plan.
23	And I put that in the form of a motion.
24	MAYOR KELLY: Is there a second?
25	Second. Any discussion? All those in

1	favor say aye.
2	IN UNISON: Aye.
3	MAYOR KELLY: Any opposed? The
4	matter passes.
5	COMMISSIONER SCIROCCO: Next item or
6	my agenda is Discussion and Vote:
7	Authorization for the Mayor to Sign an
8	Agreement with CFI Contracting,
9	Incorporated, for Sanitary Wastewater
10	Pump Station Upgrades - General
11	Construction Contract in the amount of
12	956,200 dollars.
13	In 2014, CT Mill Engineering
14	evaluated seven pump stations for
15	upgrades to their aging infrastructure.
16	The current upgrades include Excelsior
17	Springs Pump Station, Quad 2 Pump
18	Station, and a Hathorn North Pump
19	Station.
20	Excelsior Springs Pump Station at
21	the intersection of Excelsior Springs
22	Avenue and Victoria Lane. Access to the
23	pump station was in the middle of the
24	roadway, and the valve pit is only
25	accessible from the pump station wet

1	well. Vehicles must drive over the wet
2	well hatch, and it is very noisy and not
3	designed for traffic loading.

Additionally, electric and control systems are located in a below grade structure with insufficient access and ventilation. The proposed upgrade will consist of a newly constructed precast concrete pump station and valve pit to be located outside of the roadway while reusing the existing pump station as a manhole to collect wastewater. The existing pump control, kiosk, and control panel will be demolished and removed while a new kiosk with -- with a concrete slab and pump control panel will be constructed.

Quad 2 is located at the intersection of Duplainville Road and Cady Hill Boulevard within the Saratoga County right-of-way. The existing pump rails have been damaged, and control valves can only be accessed from within the pump station wet well.

The upgrade will need a newly

1	constructed precast concrete pump station
2	and valve pit while removing and and
3	demolishing the existing pump station.
4	The existing pump control kiosk and
5	control panel will be demolished and
6	and removed while a new kiosk with a
7	concrete slab and pump control panel will
8	be constructed. We are also adding a new
9	emergency generator to this station.
10	Hathorn North is located at the
11	intersection of Hathorn Boulevard and
12	Tamarack Trail. The upgrade will need a
13	new pump package assembly with pumps,
14	rails, hatch, and controls off the road,
15	while reusing the existing pump station
16	structure. The existing pump control
17	kiosk and control panel will be
18	demolished and removed while a new kiosk
19	with a concrete slab and pump control
20	panel will be constructed.
21	Therefore, I move for the mayor to
22	sign an agreement with CFI Contracting,
23	Inc., for sanitary wastewater pump
24	station upgrades - general construction
25	contract in the amount of 956,200

1	dollars. And I put that in the form of a

25	Code and 10 State Standard.

1	All equipment enclosures will have
2	NEMA 3R weatherproof ratings. Alarms
3	will be used to notify DPW personnel via
4	telephone dialers twenty-four hours a
5	day.
6	Stilsing will also provide the
7	electrical hookup for the new emergency
8	generator at Quad at the Quad 2
9	Station.
10	Therefore, I move for the mayor to

13	upgrades, an electrical contract in the
