1	INFINITE ROOFING: So as a business,
2	trying to obtain building permits, we've
3	come up against a brick wall. We've
4	received a very nasty letter from Patrick
5	Cogan this week stating that the city
6	council has approved this issue of we
7	have an issue, and this goes to the
8	safety of all of your residents when
9	you're not inspecting these roofs.
10	And you're asking what they do.
11	They ask for the roofer to sign and
12	notarize a statement saying that we did
13	something we didn't do before they will
14	issue the building permit. Actually,
15	that's against the law, okay.
16	I have already checked with the
17	Department of State who licenses your
18	building inspectors, that is not a
19	procedure. They are supposed to be
20	inspecting if they require a building
21	permit.
22	I spoke with Richard Tereesh (ph.)
23	yesterday, and he basically said that
24	all's we're doing is making trouble
25	because we won't break the law in order

Patrick Cogan has told us, and I
will read from his letter to me, that
according to the city council approved a
new fee schedule, the city council
reviewed their policies and procedures at
the end of last year, decided to allow an
alternate process for submission of ice
and water affidavits based on highly
valued feedback.

I have asked what valued feedback, because the attorney general certainly does not agree for us to go and sign this and notarize the statements stating that we did something. That is against the law, okay. So I don't know what highly valued feedback.

Katie (ph.) explained to us about the hundred dollar deposit. So we give you a hundred dollar deposit for you to go out and do your job. And then we get the hundred dollar deposit back if after we complete the job, we send in our ice and water barrier.

13	name is Ken Grey. I live in Saratoga
14	Springs. I'm representing myself and
15	Complete Streets, and I want to thank and
16	applaud the mayor and the council for
17	their foresight in investing in the
18	community for the Missing Links project.
19	Approximately 1.6 million dollar grant
20	was obtained. I want to highlight the
21	benefits. Obviously, safety which Jason
22	outlined for young and for old and in-
23	between. The health benefits. The
24	economic benefits are enormous. And we

all saw this exponentially during COVID.

1	So again, I applaud you for looking
2	at the Missing Links project. And it's
3	an opportunity for all of us to get from
4	point A to point B without an automobile.
5	It's really the part of the charm which
6	draws residents and outsiders to visit
7	Saratoga Springs. And I have to
8	personally be thankful for the foresight
9	of our people that lived before us, a
10	hundred years ago, that decided to place
11	sidewalks. It brings our community
12	together. It enables us to get to know
13	our neighbors better. It's also part of
14	the Complete Streets Plan which city
15	council and the mayor adopted in 2016.
16	And when I voted tonight at Lake
17	Avenue for the school board elections,
18	it it really was reassuring just
19	seeing the number of people walking down
20	the street on their sidewalks getting
21	there. There were no problems parking
22	cars at Lake Avenue because people were
23	walking there.
24	So again, I just want to say thank



you for your foresight and your

11	Vanderbilt Ave. Just two quick comments
12	and a question regarding the Missing
13	Links project.
14	First comment. I spoke with Tina
15	Carton yesterday for quite a bit on this
16	project, and I just want to say that it
17	does seem like the analysis was very
18	thorough, and the intent is very good.
19	So I do applaud the team for that and
20	thank Tina specifically for her time in
21	walking me through the project.
22	My question, however, is the side
23	opposite my house is an existing
24	cemetery. The land is really not in use.
25	I understand that one of the stipulations

Saratoga Springs Council Meeting 5-18-21 with the grant that was received is that no private -- no private land could be purchased, and I think there's one other, eminent domain could not be claimed.

My only question though is that this is going to have a fairly significant impact to the residents on our side of the street with cutting away property and trees. So I just ask that if -- we've exhausted all options for possibly getting a partial waiver to that requirement from the government funding just to see, you know, if there's any -- really, is anything that can be done to move the sidewalk to the side of the street which really isn't in use.

And the only other comment that I have is, again, for the greater good of the community, this seems like a great project, but again there are many individual homeowners that are going to be impacted by these changes.

And the only way that we really found out was just a flyer. And it really wasn't very specific. So my only

2	have been nice to have something more
3	than just a generic flyer, nonspecific,
4	notifying us of the impacts and, you
5	know, hopefully in the future something
6	like this would be you know, at least
7	some some more engagement with those

9	project such as this.

25	coming up. So we cannot forget about

We also ask -- I was asking also -we have some grants -- art grants. We
wanted to know if we could do a mural, a
Black Lives Matter mural. I think that
Juneteenth is coming up as well, and this
is a perfect time for us to show -- show
some pride for Black Lives Matter as
well.

We also are going to be having Pride events and different events as well, cultural events in the city. I hope that city council will support our events in bringing culture into the city as well.

And that's pretty much all I got,
besides the fact that we also -- sorry.

I was going to figure out, we're going to
have to eventually have a conversation
with all the activists and social justice
workers that are from Saratoga Springs

23	too would like to commend the sidewalk

25	enhancement of the neighborhoods and the

2	small families who live on the portion of
3	Vanderbilt that you are examining, and
4	for consideration, and on the East Side
5	only nine small families, and our
6	properties are so short, they're so, so
7	small, seventy by whatever in. And we
8	are wondering collectively, all of us
9	families, if we couldn't consider
10	enhancing our block with sidewalks which
11	I see the necessity of, but across the
12	street there is nothing. And the people
13	across the street won't mind at all.
14	Whereas, we nine families have forty-
15	year-old trees that we ourselves planted
16	and little front lawns that we maintain.
17	We, ourselves, put on an addition about
18	nine years ago and came out fourteen foot
19	and that was all approved and we greatly
20	enhanced our own home and the
21	neighborhood by doing so.
22	And the property across the street
23	has really been worsening in appearance
24	over the years. Last winter, another
25	tree yet came down, demolished another

1	section right across from the
2	intersection of Fenlon. And there is
3	enough room for a sidewalk if the
4	committee would just reconsider at least
5	looking at it. Maybe take a walk by it.
6	Because there's cars and trucks that
7	and they park perfectly without even
8	overlapping onto the blacktop.
9	So a sidewalk just from coming out
10	of the village, running down to the end
11	of Fenlon would be ideal on that side of
12	the street. Mostly, it's brush and not
13	even as many large trees as we happen to
14	have on our own properties.
15	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. That's
16	your time. Thank you.
17	MS. MORGAN: Okay. Thank you.
18	MAYOR KELLY: Ashley Budd.
19	MR. WASHBURN: Start video. There
20	we go. Hello Mayor Kelly.
21	Actually, more of a question than it
22	is a comment about finding information
23	about the timing of all this. I live on
24	Grand Avenue. So we are in the stretch
25	between West Avenue

9	live on Grand Avenue. I'm talking about
10	the sidewalks, and the missing sidewalks
11	project. We're in that stretch of
12	sidewalk between West Avenue and Hyde
13	Avenue where sidewalks are necessary.
14	Just kind of I think it's a great
15	idea, great project, totally needed.
16	We've got a lot of people walking on the
17	street on Grand Avenue, back and forth.
18	Question about timing. And then
19	also for those who are living on the side
20	of the street where the trees are going
21	to be kind of in the way, I know of one
22	neighbor up the street whose tree must be
23	twelve feet in diameter, for example. So
24	what what is going to happen to those
25	trees? Who's responsible for them?

1	Those are my questions. And if there's a
2	place where I can find those answers I'd
3	love it. Otherwise, you know, that's my
4	comment is I'd like to know that
5	MAYOR KELLY: We have a presentation
6	tonight. So if you hang on
7	MR. WASHBURN: Yeah.
8	MAYOR KELLY: you know, and just
9	stay on the line, you'll see a
10	presentation come up on the Missing Links
11	project.
12	MR. WASHBURN: Perfect. Thank you.
13	MAYOR KELLY: Okay. Great. Thank
14	you.
15	MR. WASHBURN: Thank you.
16	MAYOR KELLY: Okay. Steve
17	Godlewski.
18	MR. GODLEWSKI: Good evening
19	everybody. Thank you for your time.
20	My name is Steve Godlewski. I live
21	at 20 Central Avenue in Saratoga Springs.
22	I'm a transportation engineer, a former
23	member of the city's Complete Streets
24	Advisory Board, and father of two
25	children who will walk to school.



1	I'm speaking tonight in support of
2	the Missing Links sidewalk project. Now,
3	professionally, I've worked on similar
4	projects for almost twenty years, and I
5	can say I never really fully appreciated
6	the need for good sidewalks until I had
7	to push a stroller around, or walk with
8	my children and navigate the city.
9	A continuous, safe, pedestrian
10	network is critical for any community.
11	On a fundamental level, sidewalks
12	connect places or people with the
13	places that they need to go.
14	Many people depend on sidewalks for
15	everyday transportation. Not everyone
16	wants to own or is able to own a motor
17	vehicle. It's not just about recreation.
18	Filling the Missing Links while the
19	safety benefits for residents. A gap in
20	the network forces pedestrians to walk
21	into the road, along the shoulder, or
22	worse. Cross the street to a sidewalk or
23	the other side making a mid-block
24	crossing. Statistically, mid-block
25	crossings are one of the more dangerous

1	actions for a pedestrian to take.
2	Thank you to the city for moving
3	this summer project forward. It's an
4	investment in the health and safety of
5	the residents, and thank you for your
6	time.
7	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you.
8	Okay. Any other comments?
9	Then we are closing the public
10	comment period. I would like to ask
11	Vince DeLeonardis to come on, our city
12	attorney to address Infinite Roofing.
13	MR. DELEONARDIS: Thank you, Mayor.
14	So the speaker made mention of an
15	alternative process, and that is
16	something that we put into place towards
17	the end of last year, beginning of this
18	year. And with regard to the valued
19	feedback, that played a role in that.
20	Part of that feedback actually came from
21	the individual and her company.
22	Roof work in the City of Saratoga
23	Springs, whether it's a new installation
24	or a re-roof requires a building permit.
25	New installation is an insurance or

1	requirement that there is ice and water
2	barrier that's installed. And we have
3	made a change to the prior pre-existing
4	practice about the submission of an
5	affidavit, and the applicant now provides
6	a one hundred dollar deposit that is
7	refundable upon the submission of the
8	affidavit indicating that the ice and
9	water shield has been properly installed,
10	of course, after they perform that
11	installation.
12	Alternatively, the applicant can
13	request an inspection and have the
14	building department go and conduct a
15	physical inspection. But because roofing
16	projects are typically done in a day or
17	two, the affidavit is something that's
18	traditionally been utilized.
19	So we did make those changes, and
20	that's something that we're providing for
21	on a move-forward basis.
22	MAYOR KELLY: Great. Thank you.
23	Any other comments from the council? I
24	think that there are a couple of things

that I'd like to say about the Missing

1	Links project.
2	I think that Tina Carton and her
3	team have done a terrific job on this,
4	and I think that if anybody in the public
5	has any questions, Tina is more than
6	likely to come and chat with you wherever
7	you can meet, and tell you all about the
8	process and the timing and all of that.
9	So if you don't if they don't
10	address that in their presentation,
11	please call Tina Carton in the planning
12	department. She can help you with that.
13	The that's all I have. Anybody
14	else have anything? Okay. Then we are
15	closing public comment period. Thank
16	you.
17	Let's move on to our presentations.
18	Our first presentation is Tina Carton
19	will lead our Missing Sidewalks
20	presentation. They'll come on. Tina,
21	are you there?
22	MS. CARTON: I'm here. I'm just
23	waiting to have my video start.
24	MAYOR KELLY: And there you go.
25	Thank you.

2	Carton. I'm the administrator of Parks,
3	Open Lands Historic Preservation and
4	Sustainability for the City of Saratoga
5	Springs, New York.
6	I would like to introduce Dan
7	Rourke. Dan Rourke is a engineer that
8	was hired by the city. He is part of
9	Barton & Loguidice, and they won the bid
10	to do the preliminary and final design
11	for the Missing Sidewalk Links project.
12	MAYOR KELLY: Thank you.
13	MR. ROURKE: Thank you, Tina.
14	Okay. Everyone can view my screen?
15	MAYOR KELLY: Yes.
16	MR. ROURKE: Yes. Okay. Great.
17	Again, thank you, again, for having
18	me tonight, and thank you Tina.
19	Appreciate the comments that were already
20	made. A lot of kind of what I was
21	planning to say has already been said,
22	but I am planning to give a brief
23	overview of the project, just an
24	overall an over, you know, a 10,000
25	foot view of what the project

1	encompasses, the locations where we plan
2	to do this work. And I also want to let
3	everyone know that while this more of an
4	overview tonight, there are more specific
5	meetings planned for this summer, four
6	neighborhood meetings to discuss more
7	direct questions, or details about your
8	specific streets in the city. And, you
9	know, we'll go over the details of when
10	those meetings will be here and where you
11	can find out all that information in just
12	a little bit.
13	Sorry, I just have a little delay
14	here. Here we go.
15	Quick introduction to what our
16	project team is. City, is obviously, the
17	project sponsor, project owner. We are
18	working with the Capital District
19	Transportation Committee. They actually
20	evaluated the project merits originally
21	and awarded the funding to the city.
22	The grant is through the Federal
23	Highway Administration. It's an eighty
24	percent/twenty percent program. So
25	eighty percent from the federal

1	government, twenty percent locally. And
2	we, with the city, are working directly
3	with the New York State Department of
4	Transportation.
5	The Department of Transportation
6	oversees the funding, and make sure all
7	the federal aid procedures are followed,
8	and oversees the, you know, the
9	construction details and that
10	specifications are followed.
11	So a quick background of where this
12	project initiated from. It's been
13	studied early on, you know, over the past
14	six years already through the

comprehensive plan and the Complete Streets plan.

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So the locations that we're looking at for this specific project were all outlined in what's called, you know, the urban core of the city. So within a onemile radius of the urban core center of the city, several locations of these missing links were identified. And this project will specifically address eleven of those locations.

1	Some statistics from New York State
2	Department of Transportation. And
3	really, it's just straight data about
4	pedestrian safety here. But, you know,
5	3,600 accidents in 2015, over 600
6	fatalities, and it really the essence
7	of this project is to address all of this
8	data that has been presented across the
9	state before it becomes an issue in, you
10	know, the city here.
11	And how we address getting in front
12	of those statistics, you know, by
13	eliminating these gaps in the sidewalk
14	network, make sure everyone has a
15	continuous sidewalk to walk on, so
16	residents are not hopping from sidewalk
17	over grass onto the street back to the
18	sidewalk and provide accessible
19	connections. Everything will be ADA
20	compliant, sidewalk ramps and the
21	sidewalks themselves.
22	And overall, this project will
23	provide 1.8 miles of new sidewalks which
24	is a huge a huge number. Complete
25	connections at these eleven locations.

1	And construct all of the sidewalks within
2	the city's right-of-way.
3	Okay. So where are these locations?
4	You can see the map on the screen:
5	Seward Street, First Street, State
6	Street, Third Street, a couple locations
7	on East Ave., Vanderbilt Ave., West
8	Fenlon, Congress, and Grand Ave.
9	And then how were these chosen?
10	These were, as we already said
11	originally, studied in the Complete
12	Streets Linkage Study, and these were
13	identified as a good fit for this federal
14	aid project.
15	All of these locations, the new
16	sidewalk can be built within the city's
17	right-of-way, the property that the city
18	owns.
19	Each location will provide a link
20	between existing sidewalks. They were
21	vetted through evaluation of several
22	constraints, and the overall project
23	budget. And this has been studied and
24	worked on through collaboration of many
25	city departments, including DPW,

1	engineering, public safety, and of
2	course, Tina leading all of those
3	efforts.
4	I do want to show an example of a
5	more detailed look at each segment. So
6	I'm providing an example of Seward Street
7	here.
8	So when when we come back and
9	present for the neighborhood meetings, we
10	will zoom in on each location so any
11	resident that's present, you know, we can
12	look at your specific question, you can
13	look at your specific property, we can go
14	over, you know, why this location was
15	chosen, you know, specifically point out
16	if there are tree impacts, what driveways
17	are crossed, where new drainage is
18	proposed.
19	So just to give you an idea of when
20	we have those meetings, we will be more
21	focused in on each segment and give you a
22	chance for a back-and-forth conversation.
23	I did want to bring up some
24	frequently asked questions that routinely

come up on sidewalk projects.

1	So snow removal, maintenance of the
2	sidewalk, it's always a concern when
3	there's a new sidewalk put in place.
4	So what I'm showing here is the city
5	code. The city code is on the city
6	website if anybody in the public would
7	like to go look it up. But basically,
8	once the sidewalks are built, it will be
9	the responsibility of the adjacent
10	property owner to maintain, you know,
11	after a snowstorm, especially.
12	MS. CARTON: And I guess I just
13	wanted to add too that within the city
14	code, even if you don't have a sidewalk,
15	your responsibility via the code is to
16	have a four-foot path cleared of snow in
17	front of your property.
18	MAYOR KELLY: Okay.
19	MR. ROURKE: Thank you.
20	And another common question is
21	what's going to happen with my driveway?
22	How how does the sidewalk interact
23	with my driveway or copied up here on

25

the screen, this is the city standard

detail, and this is the intention of the

	Saratoga Springs Council Meeting 5-16-21
1	project to meet what the city typically
2	will construct. So this project will
3	create a continuous sidewalk across
4	driveways. And the asphalt apron out to
5	the road will try to be as long as the
6	grades work out, you know, minimally
7	invasive. But to construct a sidewalk,
8	if, you know, the work limits need to go
9	out to the road, then all that driveway
10	apron would be replaced.
11	And somebody asked earlier about,
12	you know, what is this project schedule
13	and which is up here on the screen
14	now. So, you know, we've been working or
15	preliminary design which is basically
16	looking at an overview of the project and
17	determining what the probable cost
18	estimates are going to be and evaluating,
19	you know, specific details before we go
20	out to bid for a contractor.
21	We will be finishing up that process
22	here by July, and the construction
23	portion of the project that will start in
24	next spring.



Now, where is the funding come from?

Saladoga Splings Council Meeting 3-10-21
It's through this program called Surface
Transportation Program, and it's an
eighty/twenty program. So 1.9 million
dollar grant. The 1.25 million comes
from the federal government, and there is
the local match from the city, 380,000
dollars. Of this funding, 1.5 million
dollars is set aside for the actual
construction of the project.

Now, where can you find out more information on the project? There is a website dedicated to the project on the city's website. So there is a tab where you can go directly to the Missing Links project.

Right now, you can find general information, things that we've done to date. And then coming soon, you can subscribe to the project calendar, and you will be notified of when the four neighborhood-specific meetings will be held. And the calendar, of course, on the website will be updated as we move along in that process.

Detailed drawings that have been

1	completed to date which are similar to
2	what I showed for Seward Street will be
3	posted. And we just ask for those of you
4	looking for more information on your
5	specific street or your neighborhood,
6	please review those drawings and come
7	prepared for a discussion at those
8	neighborhood-specific meetings.
9	MAYOR KELLY: Is that it?
10	MR. ROURKE: And yes, I'd like to
11	open it back up to the city for any
12	questions or comments.
13	MAYOR KELLY: Well, I think it's
14	a I think this is a great project, and
15	I hope that we have the opportunity to do
16	more of these, because the connectivity
17	is great.
18	And I do want to tell everybody
19	that's on here listening for the Missing
20	Links that they can always call Tina
21	Carton or email her and she will she's
22	very prompt at responding and answer your
23	questions to the best of her ability. I
24	mean, she's the best in the region, if
25	not New York State. A plug for Tina.



1	So does the council have any
2	comments or questions?
3	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: I had a
4	question for Dan. Are we does it look
5	like there will be an expansion with the
6	STB STP in this next infrastructure
7	bills that are coming forward? Do we
8	have any feel for that through Congress?
9	MR. ROURKE: Oh, for the
10	transportation funding in general?
11	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Right.
12	Because there's a lot of talk
13	Republicans and Democrats seem to be in
14	somewhat of an agreement that there will
15	be another stimulus bill coming through
16	in the next few months.
17	MR. ROURKE: Um-hum.
18	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: And it's going
19	to be infrastructure related, roads. I
20	didn't know if sidewalks or these type of
21	programs if you heard if these would be
22	part of it?
23	MR. ROURKE: Yeah. I through
24	our, you know, professional
25	organizations, we've seen some of the

1	early talks, and I don't recall the exact
2	number, but it was an increase in the
3	current plan. And I think by, you know,
4	infrastructure in general, bridges and
5	highways, obviously, take a good portion

8	obviously, gained a lot of steam in more
9	recent years.
10	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: So on this
11	grant, is this something that we already
12	have or we have to vote for? What's the
13	process of that?
14	MAYOR KELLY: We're moving along.
15	This is a design meeting.
16	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Okay.
17	MS. CARTON: Yeah. This was already
18	bonded and approved by city council. So
19	this has been, I believe, on four or five
20	previous city council meetings.
21	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Okay. So we
22	have the ability, though, in the future
23	if for expansion of this type of
24	program potentially. I know it's not a
25	budget



1	MAYOR KELLY: I think we can apply.
2	We have to apply.
3	MS. CARTON: Yeah.
4	MAYOR KELLY: And, you know, Tina
5	and the planning department watch those
6	things all the time. So Tina applies to
7	everything that I get she gets, and we
8	talk about it and she applies for what we
9	can handle. So yes, if it comes again,
10	I'm sure we will absolutely do this
11	because that's what we do.
12	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: No, yeah, I'm
13	just kind of looking forward because I
14	think it's going to happen earlier than
15	later, and it would be a situation where
16	I didn't know this was a great
17	presentation and I live by a number of
18	these streets and I know exactly what
19	they're talking about on Third and First.
20	If we if there was a couple of
21	streets that didn't make the cut here
22	that that would make the next cut if
23	there was additional funding.
24	MAYOR KELLY: Yeah. And then
25	always you know, when a street

1	doesn't make the cut, it's the guideline
2	that they give us. So those those are
3	all in to how we had to pick, you know.
4	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Okay.
5	MAYOR KELLY: Because they do give

7	a lot of streets in the city that didn't
8	make this cut. So that's why I'm really
9	hoping that in the future and future
10	councils will bring this forward, because
11	I know Tina will be here, you know,
12	bugging the next council saying let's
13	bring this one. So you know, because
14	it just makes it so much nicer for every
15	neighborhood, you know.
16	And, you know, to me, I used to ride
17	my bike and walk up the East Avenue hill
18	and that's dangerous.
19	COMMISSIONER FRANCK: Yeah.
20	MAYOR KELLY: I mean, that's a
21	really dangerous, you know, place to be
22	walking. The other one is Brandon (audio
23	interference) I mean, there's a lot of
24	major thoroughfares that need this.
25	MS. CARTON: Yeah, and my my

understanding is there are a lot of
grants coming up. There are some grants
through the consolidated funding
application this year, and then other DOT
funds.

We're actually having a discussion this week with the planning department, the Town of Wilton, and Saratoga County on some potential trail projects to extend going -- Wilton's very interested in having connections to the city and some better accessibility.

a quick thank you to the (indiscernible), because I just have to tell you that I was a resident when you guys announced it and I was so excited. So, so excited. I think one of the (indiscernible) public comments, like, I realized when I have a stroller and little kids, you know, what a challenge it can be to get around the city when you don't have connecting sidewalks. So I think this is, like, such a great project for the city.



And generally, I just wanted to

1	mention though, that I do think, you
2	know, that the code requires that we have
3	residents to clear the snow and ice in
4	front of their home and on the sidewalk
5	and create a four-foot path, I think that
6	can be challenging, I think, for a lot of
7	people, especially people who are not
8	physically able to do it, can't afford
9	someone to come to their house. And so I
10	just think it's something maybe that the
11	city should think about to offer some
12	kind of community support or organize
13	some kind of effort to aid people in one
14	of those instances so we can keep our
15	sidewalks clear but not unnecessarily
16	burden people who, you know, really,
17	physically can't do that, clear that snow
18	and ice.
19	MAYOR KELLY: So that's a great
20	project for you, Commissioner.
21	COMMISSIONER DALTON: Thanks. All
22	over it, guys.
23	MAYOR KELLY: Yeah. Any other
24	comments?
25	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Tina, thank

1	you. I know I've looked over this
2	project in detail with you, and of
3	course, you know I think Finlon is prime
4	for a sidewalk. It's such a dangerous
5	and dark area.
6	Don't forget about us way out here
7	in the west side. Buff Road drops off
8	with sidewalks. Walter and Moore have no
9	sidewalks. But this is a great way to
10	get started. Commissioner Franck
11	mentioned there might be more funding
12	coming through, and you know, sidewalks
13	is definitely one thing that the
14	community seems to rally around.
15	We heard from some folks on over
16	on Vanderbilt today, and maybe we can
17	take a little bit you know, I don't
18	know how set in stone the grant project
19	is, but maybe we can take a look at their
20	side of the street versus the other side
21	of the street at some time, you know, if
22	we're able to.

18	broadband, benefits of citywide
19	broadband. Commissioner Madigan.
20	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: Thank you,
21	Mayor.
22	So tonight is just a brief update
23	about our citywide project. It's been a
24	while since we discussed the project with
25	the public. So tonight's SiFi, Scott

1	Bradshaw is here just to give a high
2	level overview of the benefits of the
3	fiber broadband project. This is not
4	about microtrenching. It's about the
5	benefits of fiber to a city.
6	So a little background. SiFi
7	Networks is owned by two entrepreneurs,
8	Roland Pickstock and Mike Harris. Roland
9	is the founder of the Pickstock Group of
10	Companies which has been in operation
11	since the 1980s and specializes in
12	telecommunication, manufacturing, and
13	property development. It's one of
14	Europe's leading modular manufacturers
15	for residential, hotel, and student
16	accommodations. A leading UK supplier of
17	offshore building solutions.
18	Mike has built several multimillion
19	dollar businesses include TNS, a
20	communication company that provides
21	provided and maintained core technology
22	within the university, airport, banking,
23	and telecommunication sectors. TNS was
24	acquired by British Telecom in the mid-
25	2000s.



1	SiFi Networks has partnered with a
2	number of industry-leading firms to
3	deploy their FiberCity networks.
4	Whitehelm is one, APG, Nokia, is one
5	that we're very familiar with, ADCom and
6	LLI. I won't go into details on each and
7	every one of those companies. Arcadis is
8	another one but they're well known
9	telecommunication companies.
10	So with that, I think Scott has,
11	like, two slides he's going to present to
12	us. It's going to be, like, a five-
13	minute presentation, maybe ten tops. And
14	I see that he's on Zoom. Scott, you
15	ready to take over? Thank you for being
16	here.
17	MR. BRADSHAW: There we go. I just
18	want to make sure you can hear me.
19	MAYOR KELLY: Yes, we can.
20	MR. BRADSHAW: I appreciate that.
21	Scott Bradshaw, SiFi Networks.
22	So I'm just going to share my screen
23	and as Commissioner Madigan said it's
24	just a couple slides, just a refresher of
25	the investment that SiFi Networks is

1	looking to make in a community, and
2	hopefully in the very near future as both
3	parties, both the city staff department
4	and SiFi continue to align ourselves and
5	make an investment in construction
6	process.
7	So I'll just share my screen, and if
8	you just confirm that you can see that I
9	would certainly appreciate it.
10	COMMISSIONER MADIGAN: We can see
11	it.
12	MAYOR KELLY: We can see it.
13	MR. BRADSHAW: Thank you so much.
14	Okay. There we go.
15	So just as a refresh. SiFi Networks
16	as Commissioner Madigan mentioned, you
17	know, with our two founders, Roland
18	Pickstock of the Pickstock Group of
19	Companies, and Mike Harris, we're
20	deploying multiple fiber city projects
21	across six different states at the
22	moment, but SiFi itself is a developer.
23	We're not the ISP. So we identify
24	communities where we can have significant
25	economic development impact through

1	private investment using zero taxpayer
2	dollars, and that investment is through
3	broadband infrastructure.
4	Ultimately, designing gets for
5	tomorrow's world for today. That being
6	that higher diverse, highly redundant,
7	high-speed network capacity to provide
8	gigabit symmetrical speeds to homes, to
9	businesses, just as standard
LO	(indiscernible) in an asymmetrical
L1	environment.
L2	So under that structure, we actually
L3	build cities, towns, villages in one go.
L 4	We don't build neighborhoods and if
L5	that's successful, we build another one.
L 6	We actually commit to council that we'll
L7	build the entire community within a
L8	period of an agreed time and straight out
L 9	of the box. And again, all through
20	private investment. No taxpayer dollar
21	from the municipality.
22	With respect to Saratoga Springs, we
23	are proposing a new 240-mile fiber optic
24	network with the intention of leaving no

one behind.

25

1	So every residence, every business
2	will be afforded the opportunity to
3	receive fiber connectivity and that being
4	under a structure which is an open access
5	platform.

so what that ultimately means is the network, SiFi, not being the ISP, we actually bring brand new ISP competition, broadband competition, to the community so you can be near the people, the business of the community can stay with the people that currently purchase service from, or they now have an additional choice of any providers that will be on this network.

Our goal with the network is not really to be providing ten of the same thing, is to provide additional broadband choice. Certainly, you have a high capacity model premium service over the fiber infrastructure, but also to bring additional benefit services to the community. That being telemedicine, healthcare, IoT devices, and those things I'll come to in a second.



1	So that's really as you can see on
2	the screen, the footprint is the entire
3	jurisdiction of the community. The
4	network is built from a smart city basis
5	from day one being we don't build fiber
6	to the home, we don't build fiber to the
7	business, we build a smart city
8	infrastructure and fiber to the home and
9	fiber to the business. That's just a
10	natural ancillary benefits of that
11	futuristic infrastructure.
12	Once I as we begin to deploy the
13	infrastructure, it is open to multiple
14	service providers.
15	As you stand right now in your
16	community, there is zero percent fiber to
17	the homes. So that's really been one of
18	the key reasons that SiFi stuck with
19	the wanted to invest in your
20	community. I'm sure everybody's fully
21	aware, it has been a few years, and we've
22	had a number of hurdles along the way
23	with regards to just different things
24	from attracting the right investors to
25	come into the community through to just

1	the addressed data not being as we first
2	thought, but we still stuck with it and
3	(indiscernible) a change, so let's move
4	on.
5	Just some key summary points, as I
6	do not wish to take up too much of your
7	time, it's just really some salient
8	points that we'd like to touch on.
9	So fast, affordable infrastructure.
10	And again, just to reiterate, so open
11	access, it's symmetrical gigabit speed,
12	what (indiscernible) you may not be aware
13	of that terminology. You have
14	asymmetrical and symmetrical. So you may
15	see marketing campaigns that say yes, we
16	offer gigabit speed and we offer 1,000
17	megabits down. You need to read between
18	the fine line. What you may find is
19	1,000 megabits down for only 35 megabits.
20	So and in the pandemic, what
21	we've actually have all experienced where
22	we actually have kids, you know, children
23	working from studying from home,
24	connecting to schools via the internet,

and also city staff and the like

1	connecting to the appropriate municipal
2	facilities, you actually do need
3	symmetrical.
4	So the same speed coming down, the
5	same speed uploading to the connection or
6	getting or connecting to.
7	So from an affordability
8	perspective, what we are seeing across
9	the county where we're deploying our
10	networks is that the competition we're
11	creating on the network from private
12	providers competing against the wider
13	spectrum charter and AT&T and the like,
14	is that symmetrical gigabit services
15	currently I think believe to be below
16	half the price in your current community.
17	So in your current community right
18	now, I believe, there is potential where
19	you're afforded it to receive an
20	asymmetrical service which is well over a
21	a hundred dollars, and on the networks
22	we're building throughout the country,
23	we're actually seeing price points at
24	less than half that price, about five

(audio interference) symmetrical gigabit

Saratoga Springs Council Meeting 5-18-21 services.

Because we are building a citywide infrastructure, we will be removing the digital divide and driving equality, because we're going to be taking the fiber to every premise, that being every residence and business. We will actually create opportunity to remove the digital divide should the occupiers of those premises which we take fiber to wish to receive the services over the infrastructure.

Because we actually have a citywide ubiquitous platform, so there will be fibers on every single street, it creates a very interesting tool, an economic development tool to not only retain the businesses, but also actually create an environment where we actually have a high capacity redundant service to attract some very data hungry businesses which actually brings dollars to the community, creates new jobs and many things alike.

With the actual smart city infrastructure, there's some key things

in conversations we're actually having
across the country at the moment in
various cities of all different shapes
and sizes, and some of the key ones,
actually going back to the point of the
pandemic, is connecting school children
directly to their schools.

Now, lots of things have certainly been learnt that, and you don't always need to be in the building to receive certain lessons. Certainly, what we experienced on the East Coast when we do have stay-at-home snow days, so to speak, we actually have the potential for mechanisms to now remove that through the likes of the Zooms and Teams and on other particular applications of the world.

So using this infrastructure,
because we're going to be passing every
single building, and we have -- we will
have the ability to take fiber directly
into everyone's home but more so, in the
topic of conversation, a child's home, we
will be able to actually directly connect
a child's home to the school securely

1	without actually having to go via the
2	internet as well. So it allows us not
3	only to create very secure redundant
4	paths in that scenario, but it also
5	allows us to use the high capacity
6	bandwidth available through fiber
7	connectivity rather than cable coax.
8	Again, because we actually will be
9	having a citywide infrastructure, the
10	municipality is a significant beneficiary
11	of this. Not only will we because we
12	have an agreement in place with the city
13	to provide smart city connectivity, as
14	well as smart (indiscernible) fiber
15	connectivity you would actually
16	receive seeing direct cost savings to
17	the city while at the same time
18	significantly increasing the data
19	capacity between multiple locations.

13	been on top of our '20 and '21 budgets.
14	To be sure the pandemic was taken into
15	consideration and the appropriate steps
16	were taken to keep the city running.
17	The report reprised a summary of
18	findings or methodology or approach to
19	review information on the city's
20	background and recommendations.
21	Overall, the city overall the
22	Office of the State Controller found the
23	city council adequately assess the impact
24	of the pandemic on financial operations

by developing estimates for significant

2	2021 adopted budget does not include
3	estimated does include estimated

9	Madigan at all the meetings has regularly
10	provided the council and the community
11	with updates throughout this process this
12	year for the 2021 adopted budget late
13	last year.
14	There were three recommendations
15	made as follows.
16	The council should amend the general
17	fund budget for the federal aid revenue
18	shortfall, if any.
19	Council should be prepared to amend
20	the general fund budget in the event the
21	revenue projections for AIM funding and
22	VLT aid are not fully realized.
23	And third, the council should
24	carefully monitor revenues and
25	expenditures throughout the year and

11	percent has been collected, or 9,850,793
12	dollars. Last year at this time, fifty-
13	seven percent was collected.
14	You will recall that property taxes
15	can be paid in four installments with the
16	first installment due on March 1st.
17	However, the city offers a discount of
18	2.25 percent if the full year is paid on
19	or before March 1. This accounts for the
20	greater than twenty-five percent
21	collection rate after only the first due
22	date has passed.
23	As of $3/31/21$ , the city has not
24	received many of its other larger revenue
25	streams.

1	For sales tax, figures include only
2	one month since February and March
3	collections are not distributed to the
4	city from New York State taxation and
5	finance until April and May respectively
6	VLT is paid in June.
7	Hotel occupancy tax is paid to the

LO	2021 will be received in April.
L1	County surplus distribution is paid
L2	on a quarterly basis too with the first
L3	payment due in April.
L4	NYRA admissions tax is paid annual
L5	after the racing season has closed.
L 6	The bulk of franchise tax is paid
L7	annually in the last quarter of the year
L8	State aid revenue sharing is
L 9	distributed in two installments,
20	September and December. The largest
21	share is received in December
22	Mortgage tax is paid semi-annually
23	in May and November

2	finance office is at twenty-nine percent
3	collected.
4	Taking into consideration the
5	property tax revenue recognition issues,
6	approximately twenty-seven percent of
7	revenues were actually received as of

9	In 2020, the adjusted approximate
10	revenue collected was twenty-six percent
11	Water and sewer revenues, the first
12	quarter water and sewer bills for 2021
13	are mailed in April for a May 15th due
14	date.
15	Capital revenues, the city will
16	issue the general obligation bond in June
17	to finance the 2021 capital projects.
18	General fund expenses in the mayor's
19	office, many contributions to outside
20	organizations and events have been paid
21	in full as of 3/31/2021. Most other
22	expenses are fairly consistent.
23	For all departments, liability
24	insurance has been paid in full for the
25	year. Additional expenses would be for



1	claims or additional coverage.
2	Discounts on taxes is a final
3	number. Most departments' expenses are
4	running at about twenty-five percent
5	which is on target for $3/31/2021$ , and is
6	consistent with the first quarter of
7	2019. Variances are due to seasonal
8	expenses and grants.
9	Capital expenses are usually larger
10	in the months where weather is more
11	conducive to construction.
12	In addition, large vehicle purchase
13	often take months to be built according
14	to bid specifications.
15	For community development, since the
16	community development block grants are
17	awarded on a different schedule than the
18	city's fiscal year, no budget is
19	established.
20	And that completes the submission of
21	the first quarterly report which was due
22	to council by May 15th and was emailed to
23	you under separate cover with the
24	presentation taking place this evening.

13	We continue to review revenues and
14	meet with departments about potential

17	set some priorities for the 2022 budget.
18	Let's see what I have. Our notes
19	about the OSC budget review, and I think
20	Commissioner Franck, again, covered that
21	nicely so I will move on from there.
22	Let's see. Some good news. We have
23	received disbursements for VLT aid and
23 24

healthier for June which is a month in
which the city makes much greater than,
you know, normal number of disbursements
including the remittance to the county
and school tax amounts and that the
city has collected.

This June, we also owe the 6.3 million dollar plus interest short term tax anticipation note that we borrowed from Adirondack Trust last year. We are still considering our best payment strategy looking at cash flow and revenues and expenses and what we may want to do for the mid-June budget amendments. So we're considering, you know, paying it all back and improve our financial outlook, refinance it all and incur another year of interest which to date really has been nominal, pay some, and maybe refinance some. So I will be in touch with the council as we put together a bigger -- a better picture of

2	More good news. The 2021 bond
3	rating on a final positive note, the city
4	received a draft report for it's 2021

9	outlook now indicates its view regarding
10	the potential direction of long term
11	credit rating over the intermediate term.
12	So it's given it's dropped the
13	negative outlook which is good. I'm not

17	a draft of the report at this point in
18	time. But I, at least, wanted to let

13	of our sixteen- and seventeen-year-olds
14	are already vaccinated, have at least one
15	dose. That is much higher than many
16	other numbers in the state.
17	We've also increased the number of
18	appointments for twelve- to fifteen-year-
19	olds as they've been authorized. And we
20	expect that six- to eleven-year-olds may
21	be authorized late summer or early fall.
22	So unfortunately, it'll be bit on them.
23	The governor did issue some new
24	guidance with regards to wearing masks

particularly for those who are vaccinated

1	and following social distancing.
2	Unfortunately, as has happened
3	before, the written guidance has not
4	followed with any more specification than
5	the governor announced.
6	So it is believed that right now if
7	you are fully vaccinated, which is two
8	weeks after completion of the vaccine
9	series, you are not required to wear a
10	mask in many public areas. However, at
11	this time, they are still required in
12	schools through the end of June and
13	healthcare facilities and private
14	businesses may continue to require them
15	irrespective of the governor's order.
16	Second item on my agenda is a public
17	health expansion. As I discussed before,
18	the public health department is expanding
19	to include environmental services.
20	Today, the board formally authorized
21	200,000 dollars in a special fund to help
22	assist with the legal and contract funds

23 for that. And also formally appointed
24 the Saratoga County Public Health
25 Advisory Task Force which includes

2	For Clifton Park, myself, Commissioner
3	Kuhles, and Brian Miner who's a former
4	director of the New York State Department
5	of Health. These terms are for two years
6	with the idea that we will be
7	transitioning to the full department in
8	that time which will include items such
9	as subdivisions, development, water,
10	cooling towers, tattoo parlors,
11	restaurant, and camping sections and the
12	like.
13	The third item on my agenda is
14	Saratoga County Resilience Committee. I
15	spoke about it last time. Any individual
16	interested can email
17	committee@saratogacountyresilience.com.
18	The focus will be on preparing our county
19	for any changes, disasters. But not just
20	big items, also kind of smaller slow
21	boiled, you might call them.
22	In comparison to emergency services,
23	it tends to work on the front end in
24	preparing and reducing the need for
25	emergency response because things have

1	been prepared for on the front end.
2	They will be looking for a variety
3	of individuals with experience and
4	expertise and interest. And the website,
5	Saratoga County Resilience, will be up
6	shortly, but at this time you can email
7	with any interest, again to
8	committee@saratogacountyresilience.com.
9	That concludes most of my agenda,
10	but I will also say I'm really going to
11	miss Pam, and she made really good cakes
12	for everybody's birthday too. So
13	MAYOR KELLY: Great. Thank you,
14	Commissioner Supervisor, sorry.
15	Any other comments from the council?
16	Thank you all for this evening, and
17	have a great night. We are adjourned.
